PUBLIC HEALTH CONSIDERATIONS OF CHEMICAL AND BIOLOGICAL WEAPONS Including reflections on the 2013 UN Investigation Mission in the Syrian Arab Republic

The public health considerations of chemical and biological weapons cover aspects of both public health and security. In this regard, the experience of the 2013 investigation of the alleged use of chemical weapons in the Syrian Arab Republic serves as a useful and timely example of how both these aspects of an alleged use, public health and security, may be addressed through a single mechanism - the UN Secretary-General's Mechanism for Investigation of Alleged Use of Chemical, Biological, and/or Toxin Weapons.

The public health considerations of use of chemical and/or biological weapons - whether natural, accidental or deliberate - are broad and have historically been emphasized by the international community as worthy of serious consideration.
