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Government Action — Visit of Omar Al Bashir and Failure to Satisfy Obligation to Arrest

President Omar Al Bashir of Sudan went to the Republic of Chad on 7 August 2011 to attend the swearing-in ceremony of re-elected Head of State Idriss Deby Itno. President Al Bashir is the subject of an arrest warrant by the ICC for genocide, war crimes and crimes against humanity committed against the civilian population in Darfur. Chad is a State Party to the ICC and as such, was obliged by the *Rome Statute* to arrest any person for whom the Court has issued a warrant.²

Subsequently, PTC I decided that the Republic of Chad failed to cooperate with the ICC by not arresting and surrendering Omar Al Bashir to the Court during his visit, and referred the matter to both the UN Security Council and the Assembly of States Parties.³
