## EU environmental norms and third countries: the EU as a global role model? (April 19)

As the second event in CLEER's project 'Commercial power Europe: advancing societal and environmental goals through trade relations', the workshop focused on various issues related to the EU's promotion of environmental standards in third countries. The sessions dealt with the following topics: (i) EU and private sector initiatives aimed at promoting EU environmental standards in third states to introduce EU

legal instruments that influence (or fail to influence) third states, and the private sector initiatives that may trigger regulatory responses; (ii) the European Principles for the Environment (EPE) initiative of Europe-based Multilateral Financing Institutions, such as the EBRD applying EU environmental norms to projects outside the EU; (iii) sustainability criteria in the EU biofuels legislation to force changes in production methods by

countries exporting to the EU, including legal issues in EU-Brazil biofuels cooperation; and (iv) topical aspects of climate change such as the EU's ETS and Aviation policy, legal and political challenges in applying EU rules to non-EU airlines, and the effects of climate change on flying airplanes.
