

# Local authorities and legal pathways

Since the formation of the movement SEEBRÜCKE in July 2018, many cities, municipalities and communes declared themselves to be in solidarity. They stand against the European isolationist policy, and promise to facilitate more refugees a safe arrival. This means they fulfil at least one of the <u>demands of SEEBRÜCKE</u>.

On the morning of 14 June, the cities of Berlin, Detmold, Freiburg, Flensburg, Greifswald, Hildesheim, Kiel, Krefeld, Marburg, Potsdam, Rostock and Rottenburg am Neckar founded the alliance "Cities of Safe Harbours". The cities thus confirm their willingness to accept additional refugees from the Mediterranean and are taking the first steps towards implementation. Since then, other cities ioined the alliance


















#### The GFMD Mayors Mechanism




The Mayors Mechanism is a means to formalize the relationship between the government-led GFMD process and the local authorities participating in the Mayoral Forum on Human Mobility, Migration, and Development ('Mayoral Forum'), an annual City-led dialogue launched in 2013 at the UN General Assembly's Second High Level Dialogue on Migration and Development (HLD). The Mechanism provides local authorities with opportunities for peer-to-peer learning, networking, and exchange of practices. It establishes a platform to interact with States, and provides an opportunity to bolster innovative solutions to shared challenges. It also aims to add depth to the GFMD deliberations by bridging existing divides between local realities and global policy discussions, and between
