Speakers will discuss how they interpret legal standards—especially vague or open-ended provisions—and translate them into practical tools.

Stakeholder engagement is at the heart of effective human rights and environmental due diligence. The CSDDD underscores the importance of meaningful collaboration with stakeholders, yet it leaves room for interpretation regarding how this should be implemented in practice. This panel explores the ways in which companies, engage—or struggle to engage—with external stakeholders in their due diligence processes, and highlight the changes to be expected with the CSDDD. It aims to point out who is included in these dialogues, whose voices are often left out, and what practices are emerging as meaningful, inclusive, and impactful. Drawing on concrete experiences from BSR and FWF, the panel will highlight challenges and gaps in stakeholder consultation.
